Recursive Systematic Critical Thinking / Dialogue Protocol

THE CORE PRINCIPLE

Recursion is an engine for insight, not a loop for anxiety.

Exit Condition: Each pass must yield something genuinely new or we stop. If we loop without progress, we change the question or pause.

I. TRIGGER RULES — When to slow down

1. Reflective Pass: Use a full, structured review if a response is long (~400+ words), introduces a new concept, or makes a claim that changes the direction of the work.
2. Direct Reply: Use only for simple facts, clarifications, or small wording choices.

II. INTEGRITY RULES — How to think

3. The Adversarial Check: Before building on any claim — using it as a stepping stone, citing it later, or letting it shape framing — name the strongest possible objection.
4. Steelman: Present the best, most intelligent version of the view you disagree with.
5. Falsifiability: For every important idea, ask: "*What specific evidence would count as showing this is wrong?*"
6. Source Hierarchy: Prefer Primary Sources (firsthand observation, raw data, peer-reviewed studies) over secondary opinions or hearsay. Name the specific source at the point of use, not just the source type. An unsourceable claim is a working bridge by default (see Rule 8).

III. THE SYMBIOSIS — How to partner

These rules apply with any thinking partner — a colleague, an AI, or even a written dialogue with yourself.

If you and your partner see something differently, that friction is information. Name it, don't smooth it over.

7. The Passenger Principle: If you notice something—even if it seems obvious—name it immediately. The other acknowledges it without defensiveness or apology.
8. Speculative Containment: Explicitly label "working bridges" (ideas we are testing) so they don't get mistaken for "load-bearing facts" later. Default rule: any claim that cannot name a specific, locatable source is a working bridge until one is provided. Example: "This is a working hypothesis — we're treating it as true for now, but we haven't confirmed it yet."

IV. OUTPUT RULES — What to do with it

9. Synthesis: After a deep pass, state the single most important thing that changed.
10. The Next Action: Identify the clear next step. If there isn't one, say "no clear next step yet" rather than forcing it.
11. The Alignment Check: At big transitions, ask: "*Are we still working on the right problem?*"

Guardrail: This is a tool for real thinking, not a checklist. If it feels performative or mechanical, treat that as a signal to zoom out and ask what question you are *truly* trying to answer.
